Club Risk Assessment for Surfski & Sea kayak trips on the Solent.

Description of assessment

This RA covers Surfski trip between Tanners Lane (///indeed.pressing.mysteries) & Calshot (///conquest.reward.protrude). This trip is 14km long. Trip aimed at competent paddlers who can complete the trip in under 2 hours.

Modera

Tanners Lane, Lymington to Calshot Beach, Calshot Staying landside of the red channel markers in West Solent.

Moderate Sea conditions as defined by PUK. Max tidal flow 2 knots.

Location Details

This stretch of the Solent is a quiet section of coast, with less boat traffic than the eastern end. There is good landing all the way along the coast. Stone Point at Lepe can present a medium swell with the right conditions, but is small in comparison with Hurst or St Catherines.

There are no significant shipping movements – or need to enter the main shipping routes along this section, However the channel entering the Beaulieu River does need to be crossed.

Exemptions from this risk of assessment.

This RA does not cover the following activities. See separate RA document where appropriate.

- 1. White water paddling.
- 2. Sea Paddling.
- 3. Gym and circuit training.

Medication including inhalers and adrenaline auto-injector pens should be carried by the paddler. Coaches to be FA trained and should familiarise themselves with any medicine and how and when it is to be administered. Coaches should not administer auto-injector adrenalin unless trained to do so. Paddlers will normally administer their own medication if needed. Avoid contact with allergens. Coaches to carry mobile phones.	Consider auto-injector training for any coaches with people in their group that carry adrenaline pens. Coaches to be able to access emergency contact information for all member of their group.
